Q3 Are you proud you attended Dartmouth?







Q5 If you could do it all over, would you go to Dartmouth?





Q6 Do you think you took good advantage of the educational opportunities at Dartmouth?





Q7 How would you rate your social life at Dartmouth?





Q8 Do you think Dartmouth has changed for the better since 1971?





Q9 Did your Dartmouth experience play an important role in your life's work/career?





Q15 How did the educational experience at Dartmouth compare to the college/university you had been attending?







Q20 Did your Dartmouth experience play an important role in your life's work/career?





Q25 Do you exercise frequently/vigorously?







Q27 How much longer do you think you will live?









Q30 Are you generally optimistic or pessimistic about your future?





Q35 How engaged were you with the political turmoil (e.g. Vietnam War, Civil Rights) during our college years?





Q36 How would you describe your political point of view 1967-1971?





Q37 How would you describe your current political position?






Q38 In the last 50 years has your political position on most issues moved to the left or to the right?

Q39 What do you think are the most important issues facing the country today? (Check up to 10)





Q40 Do you have friends on both sides of the political divide?





Q41 Are you optimistic for the future of America?





Q42 Do you ever think that the current heated political atmosphere could trigger widespread violence?









Q46 In what field was your main career/occupation?







Q47 Did you ever start or own your own business?







Q51 If you are still working, when you plan to retire?





Q63 Where is your main residence located?








